SB 132 set MOWR requirements through the following definitions:





'Eligible high school student' means a student entering 9th, 10th, 11th, or 12th grade an at eligible high school.



'Eligible high school' means any private or public secondary educational institution located within Georgia and any home study program pursuant to Code Section 20-2-690.



'Dual credit course' means a postsecondary course taken by an eligible high school student at or through an eligible postsecondary institution for which the student receives secondary credit from his or her eligible high school.

Institutions are responsible for establishing their own dual enrollment/MOWR admission requirements. An 'eligible high school student' must meet the admission requirements set by the institution to be admitted to that institution.



What Did SB 132 Do?





Streamlined the 3 programs into one program. *Easier for students, parents, and K-12/higher education personnel to understand, promote, administer, etc.*

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Established a single program administered by GSFC. Takes advantage of the online processes built for the Accel program.



Reduced out-of-pocket expenses for students and their families.

Increases access by removing financial barriers.



Expands course options.

Ready

Provides students with access to more courses provided through a single course list.

MOWR Early Graduation Option



Earn a high school diploma (SB 2)

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- Student must receive credit for all EOCT courses: two English, two math, two science, and two social studies, and the required PE and Health course
 - Note: Course(s) may be taken through MOWR and/or at high school
 - Take EOC exams
 - Exams count 20% of final grade
- Earn and complete one of the following:
 - Associate degree
 - Technical diploma
 - Two certificate programs within one specific career pathway
- The student can be awarded a high school diploma

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

MOWR Updates & Reminders



- 1. MOWR students are <u>always</u> high school students
- 2. Local system makes final decision on what, how, when, where and If MOWR courses are taught at their high school
- 3. High schools should be consistent with procedures, schedules, and expectations of MOWR students as non-MOWR students
- 4. School Participation Form changed from annually to 4 years beginning 2016- 2017 school year

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Georgia's School Superintendent "Educating Georgia's Future" Math-first 3 required math courses (Alg. I, Geometry, Alg. II) are not available for any MOWR courses. MOWR approved mathematics courses

are awarded core/elective credit for the fourth mathematics course

MOWR Updates & Reminders



- A grade <u>must be posted</u> on high school transcript, even if student withdraws from MOWR course and doesn't complete course at high school
- 2. MOWR regulation 1605.5f. The high school must record on the student's high school transcript each approved course name, grade, and amount of credit hours and course unit credits earned for each course taken as a Dual Credit Enrollment student

MOWR Update



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- MOWR students can participate for 9th-12th grade years but not beyond
- If graduation requirements are met early during 12th grade year they can continue participation the rest of that year
- Only degree level MOWR courses can receive the .5 weight and meet the academic rigor course categories of the HOPE/Zell Scholarship
- Biology taken again as MOWR can count as 4th science if not matched to same high school course number
- MOWR 2016-17 Guidelines are posted on Ga Student Finance Commission webpage-gsfc.org
- Gafutures.org is where all the other MOWR documents are located

Should be required to maintain full-time high school status

GHSA and/or NCAA eligibility could be affected



Should not withdraw without approval from high school counselor

MOWR Secondary Benefits



- Courses can be taught on either the high school or college campuses
- Qualified secondary educators can teach both secondary and postsecondary courses.
 - Secondary Educators must meet college instructional credential requirements
 - Must be an agreement between the secondary and post secondary institutions
- Courses offered on high school campus in some cases
- Transportation Grants available

MOWR Eligible Students



- No residency requirement
- Meet admissions requirements and deadlines and be admitted by participating postsecondary institution
- May attend more than one postsecondary institution at a time and receive awards at both
- Maintain satisfactory academic progress

MOWR Eligible Students



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- All students enrolled in public or private high schools in Georgia or a home study program operated in accordance with O.C.G.A. 20-2-690(c)
- Sign an advisement form with the high school or home study program
- Participation available during all four years of high school enrollment (9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grades)

MOWR Grades



- Grade Conversion-local system determines conversion scale for the college letter grade.
- Grade Weight-only degree level core courses receive a .5 weight and meet academic rigor course categories for HOPE GPA calculation.
- Class ranking- local systems determine valedictorian, class rank, etc. eligibility for MOWR students.

MOWR Application

- MOWR Application is completed in three sequential steps and applies to both the electronic and paper MOWR applications
- Paper (pdf) version to be completed by home study students and students with no SSN
- Online version to be completed by eligible public and private high school students
- MOWR Applications are term specific
 - Must submit an application for each postsecondary semester or quarter of participation in the MOWR Program

MOWR School Participation Agreement



Must complete an annual participation agreement

- Georgia public or private eligible high schools
- Home study programs within the State of Georgia operated in accordance with O.C.G.A. 20-2-690(c)
- Eligible postsecondary institutions
- Participation Agreements (pdf) located on Gafutures.org
 - -Submit by July 1 (scan and email, fax or mail to GSFC)
- Students will not be allowed to participate in MOWR until the Participation Agreement is submitted to GSFC

FY2016 MOWR Participating Schools

Required Enrollment



 MOWR students attending colleges/universities on a <u>Non-Traditional</u> <u>Quarter or Semester Schedule must be enrolled in an active, current class on</u> <u>the actual FTE count day</u> in order for the local system to receive FTE funding for that student

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- Student must be enrolled full-time, 6 FTE segments, in order to earn full local FTE funding
 - This can be done by any of the following:
 - 1) Combination of high school and MOWR courses. Must include 4 courses if on 4x4 block or 6-7 courses if on 6 or 7 period day
 - 2) Full-time MOWR student at the college which is minimum of 4 courses between 12-15+ credit hours
 - 3) Travel time or other non-instructional periods are not funded, only instructional period

MOWR Program Codes



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PROGRAM CODES are used to determine the weight that will be assigned to the number of FTEs earned in funding an instructional program area.

To claim FTE funding segments, the student must be regularly scheduled for service or program instruction on the day of the count.

Students who are not regularly scheduled for service or program instruction on the day of the count must be reported according to the program weight that indicates the actual services they receive on the FTE count day.

School systems may not alter a student's schedule to capture a specific weight for the FTE count day.



GRADES 9-12: PROGRAM CODE = 'D'

• Students scheduled to receive general curriculum services in grades 9 - 12 for the entire day will normally have six segments of Grades 9-12 (PROGRAM CODE = 'D') per school day. Students in grades 9 - 12 who receive services other than the general curriculum should be coded with the appropriate program code for each segment of other curriculum services received outside of the general education program.

CTAE PROGRAM (Vocational Lab): PROGRAM CODE = 'K'



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CTAE PROGRAM (Vocational lab) weight (**PROGRAM CODE** = 'K') may be reported for students enrolled in state-approved CTAE/vocational courses that meet the following general criteria.

- Programs:
 Replacement costs of equipment and materials are at least 50 percent higher than those needed for a regular general education class. This criterion does not apply to cooperative work-study laboratories, pre-apprenticeship programs and apprenticeship programs.
- Students spend a minimum of 25 percent of the instructional time in "hands-on" activities.
- ② All equipment, software, materials, etc. used in the lab are in place and operational on the day of the FTE count.
- 2 Students are enrolled in **GRADE LEVEL** '09' '12'.

Note: JROTC and Military Science are included among the courses eligible for vocational weight.

POST-SECONDARY OPTIONS (DUAL ENROLLMENT): PROGRAM CODE = '6', or '7'



Students taking courses from a state public or private postsecondary institution while still enrolled as a high school student, and receiving credit both at the high school and at the postsecondary institution should be reported with the **PROGRAM CODE** = '6' or '7' for that course segment. Funding is available but the **PROGRAM CODE** is not weighted, per the *QBE Weights for Funding Formula Report*.

TABLE 4: Dual Enrollment PROGRAM CODES PROGRAM CODE DESCRIPTION

6--Move on When Ready: Instruction provided at TCSG or USG institutions, which is equivalent to the general education instruction under the existing PROGRAM CODE = 'D'.

7--Move on When Read: Instruction provided at TCSG or USG institutions, which is equivalent to the vocational lab instruction under the existing PROGRAM CODE = 'K'.


The student is enrolled full-time (12 or more credit hours) in a post-secondary school under MOWR and is not taking any classes at the high school. Report all 6 segments with **PROGRAM CODE** = '6' or '7' and specify the **LOCATION OF SERVICE** for each segment. Student is enrolled in Post-Secondary school under MOWR, but is also taking classes at the high school. (i.e. Student has more than 6 classes on schedule) Report the six (6) **PROGRAM CODE** segments of choice.

Student is on block schedule and has one or more **PROGRAM CODE** segments for MOWR. Report a segment representing the **PROGRAM CODE** for each of the 4 classes.

PROGRAM CODE segments 5 and 6 will be the highest and lowest weighted **PROGRAM CODE**. If **PROGRAM CODE** = '6' or '7' represents the highest or lowest segment, then report the **PROGRAM CODE** appropriate segment.

Vendor Implication: The vendor will need to determine if the **PROGRAM CODE** = '6' or '7' segment is the 5th or 6th segment based on either the equivalent general education instruction (PROGRAM CODE = 'D') OR the equivalent vocational education instruction (PROGRAM CODE = 'K').

Student has less than 6 segments and is not on a block schedule. Report the segment representing the **PROGRAM CODE** for each of the classes.







PROGRAM CODE = 'O' should be reported as a segment code for services that do not fall into any other program code listed or do not meet Georgia Performance Standards requirements.

Students participating in the Joint Enrollment Program should be reported with the **PROGRAM CODE** = 'O'. This program allows students to take courses at a state public or private postsecondary institution while still enrolled in high school; however, credit is only earned at the postsecondary institution.

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



Growth in Dual Enrollment Students








Growth in Dual Enrollment <u>Dollars</u>





Dual Enrollment Change FY2015 to FY2016










FY2016 MOWR Courses




Average Courses Per Student By High School Grade Level



FY2016 MOWR Course Type






FY2016 MOWR Core Course Areas



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Top Five FY2016 CTAE Course Subject Areas





- Continuing Education and Audit Coursework
- Courses not on the approved MOWR Course List
- Out of state college coursework

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Most Common Questions



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- 1. Can colleges set an age requirement? Yes, up to individual college.
- 2. How many terms can a student participate? Three per year, fall, spring, summer for semester, and fall, winter, spring and summer for quarter.
- 3. If a student is full-time at the high school can they still take courses through MOWR? Yes, there is no limit to the total number of courses taken except 15 hours per college institution.
- 4. Can they earn a full Carnegie unit of credit for only one semester of MOWR instruction? Yes, if the MOWR college course is a 3 or more hour college class.
- 5. Does a student have a certain time/date when they must announce they are pursuing SB2? No, it can occur anytime during the 9—12 grades.
- Do MOWR grades have to count on the student's high school transcript? Yes, every MOWR course's grade must be recorded on the high school transcript.
